Faceter's Forum

ATTACHING A BW (OHMMETER) TO A RAYTEC SHAW By Gordon Oakley

For those of you who use a Raytec Shaw to facet I have figured out a low cost way of attaching a BW (ohmmeter) so you can control your depth of cut easier. I am a retired special education teacher and found a wafer switch in my leftovers. It is only \$35 and is easy to attach. You can get one at the following web site. I use the 2" x 2" x 2mm. <http://www.inclusivetlc.com/Products/ViewProduct.aspx?psid=36&gpid=24>.

The following pictures show how to attach it.



Attach the wafer switch to a female mini plug from Radio Shack and attach the wires from that to your ohmmeter from radio shack or Harbor Freight.. Tape the switch to the Raytec Shaw platform (or even a Graves, although the switch will stick out two inches it still should work).



Place the hand held quill assembly on the platform in its normal position. You will see that the front Stop Screw is on the switch and the BW meter needle went to the right. When you attach a gem stone and start cutting you will see the meter needle stays to the left until you cut to the depth set. It works great.

However...You will need to recalibrate the front stop screw to get the right quill angle.

Please note: I do not cut with the meter sitting on the quill platform as shown.

IT WORKS!!!

I have also found how to attach a micro switch to an older Graves faceting machine to be connected to an ohm meter. Pictures next issue.

Lake Mary Lecture

On Thursday, September 9, twenty-six Girl Scouts and one tagalong boy gathered in the Lake Mary Historical Museum to learn about rocks for the Junior Badge Rocks Rock. Spotlighted in the center of the room was a collection of rocks and fossils including many on loan from Michelle Bogle, of the Central Florida Gem and Mineral Society? And in the front of the room, Steve Dubin, also a CFGMS member, spoke to the girls about rocks.

"I just wanted to get them excited about the possibilities of rockhounding and lapidary as a hobby," said Dubin. "With only half an hour or so, I wanted to hit the highlights and get them interested enough to want to learn more."

Dubin talked about the different kinds of rocks, their characteristics, and how they were sliced and slabbed to be used in making jewelry. He showed examples of rocks, slabs and cabs, and then explained the various methods of creating jewelry from the polished rocks.

The scouts interrupted his lecture with questions, raised their hands to answer his questions, and oohed and aahed over the samples of slabs, cabs and finished jewelry pieces he had to show them. And when he gave them each a stone pyramid as a gift at the end of his presentation, they were all smiles and thanks.

The exhibition, coordinated by Mary Rowell, Scout leader and Museum volunteer, called "Rocks Rock", is ran from Aug. 7 to Sept. 18 at the Lake Mary Historical Museum, 158 N.
